

Blue Springs Plans Unveiled

On November 13, the Steering Committee revealed plans for Blue Springs Nature Preserve to an audience of more than 70 state and local leaders and area residents at the Ragland Town Hall.

Finance chairman Lyman Lovejoy served as master of ceremonies for the event, recognizing the various leaders present and introducing Dr. James Sampley from First Baptist Church of Ashville for the invocation.

"Our kids are watching too much said television," Lovejoy, President of Lovejoy Realty. "We need to get them outside and their feet on the ground. We need to get back to our roots and this is a golden opportunity for us to do just that."

Steering committee chairman Spencer Weitman gave the audience an overview of the project, before turning the presentation over to Drew Wharton from 4Site, Inc., who explained the elements of the site plan. Steering committee members Marsha Boswell and Charlie and Jerry Sue Brannon also shared their thoughts and visions.

Ragland Students Preview the **Preserve**

Marsha Boswell and nine junior and senior students from the Ragland High School Ecology Club took a two-mile hike and guided tour of the Blue Springs Nature Preserve site this month.

Lyman Lovejoy and Bill Phillips escorted the group through the pastures, wetlands and forests of the site. The guides identified local flora and fauna for the students. The group also observed deer rubs, raccoon tracks, and a beaver dam.

"The students saw a tree that had been cut down and asked, 'who cut this down?" said Lovejoy. "They were delighted to hear it was a beaver that had done it. We were even able to show them the trenches left behind by beavers dragging trees through the woods."

During the hike, the students suggested names for areas of the site, such as Dueling Streams for the junction of Trout Creek and Blue Springs Fork.

"Even though they've lived in a rural area most of their lives, they have never actually had a chance to enjoy nature," said Boswell. "They had a great time, and they've already asked me if they can visit again soon."
